




## Opioids are the highest cause of drug related deaths in Washington, with 80% of deaths caused by fentanyl in 2023.

2,995 Total Overdose Deaths





### American Indian/Alaska Native Fentanyl Related Overdose Deaths in 2023

- 3.8 times the general population
- 9.2 times the general population in Whatcom County
- 2 times the rate of Washington DC (DC had the highest rate of any state/jurisdiction in the US)



## American Indian/Alaska Native **fentanyl** related overdose deaths occur **up to 9 times** the rate as compared to the statewide population rate





"Suspected opioid overdoses reported have decreased by 19.8% in Apr 2025 compared to Mar 2025." (for the general population) – WA DOH

Since 2016, the rate of opioid overdose death is increasing...and hasn't stopped increasing for American Indians/Alaska Natives in Washington.

Washington's overall drug overdose mortality rate masks racial disparities.






### **Washington Opioid Overdose Mortality Rate by Race**





## **Premature Deaths:** AI/AN have lost substantially more collective potential years of life when compared to other populations







of drug overdose deaths had at least one potential opportunity for intervention



## 2025 Accomplishments: Continuum of Care

#### Legislative accomplishments

- ✓ Directive for HCA to work with Tribes and UIHPs to develop operational plan for Tribal Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization (BHASO)
- ✓ Funding for Traditional Indian Medicine Waiver application and implementation.
- √ \$21.5 million in capital funds to expand behavioral health services at four Tribes

Established Tribal Housing and Wrap Around Services Committee as a subcommittee of Governor's Tribal Leaders Social Services Council (GTLSSC)

Connecting work to WA State Poverty Reduction Plan

  - Economic Services Administration
- Health Care Authority
- Department of Children Youth and Families

# 2025 Accomplishments: Public Safety and the Justice System

- ✓ Linking people to care at release re-entry program begins July 1, 2025
- ✓ Tribal Law Enforcement Conference held March 12th, 2025

Through the Tribal Warrant Work Group, the following priorities were addressed:

- ✓ Addressing complexity of jurisdiction on Tribal lands
- ✓ Establishing Tribal warrant reciprocity
- ✓ Enhancing collaboration between Tribal police and other law enforcement agencies.
- ✓ Create clear, consistent process for jurisdictional transfer between counties and Tribes
- ✓ Strengthen collaboration between different sectors including law enforcement and providers
